Further up the coast from Phuket, its turquoise bays peppered with the infamous forested limestone pillars, Phang Nga has one of the region's most spectacular landscapes.

Two of the bay's most famous spots are James Bond Island, home to Scaramanga's lair in 'The Man with the Golden Gun' and Koh Panyee, a petite island predominantly made up of skyhigh limestone turrets, plus hundreds of village huts, shacks, restaurants and houses built on stilts over the surrounding shallow sea. A unique feat of informal engineering, it also has its own school, mosque and souvenir shops all facing the sea and makes for a fascinating visit.

KRABI


Due east of Phuket is the beautiful Krabi Province, blessed with over 150 islands, perfect beaches and – most distinctively of all – dramatic karst scenery. Where the remarkable rock formations meet the emerald sea is the stuff of fairytales: a tropical coastline dotted with bays, coves and limestone mountains rising from the glistening waters.

Inland, they support a rich variety of plant and animal life, although the interior of the province with its tropical forests and the Phanom Bench mountain range, has hardly been explored. If you're after adventure, don't miss Railay with its fabulous beach and psychedelic sunsets, as well as hundreds of climbing routes up the surrounding cliffs. One of Krabi's greatest destinations is Koh Lanta Yai: a largely unspoilt island, once a favourite of backpackers and now home to several swish resorts. It still has its laid-back feel though too and makes for a very pleasant place to stay. Part of the Koh Lanta Marine National Park, the island's east coast also has a series of limestone caves at Ko Talabeng that are well worth touring in a sea kayak.









RAYAVADEE

KRABI





Nestled amongst Krabi Marine National Park,
Rayavadee is filled to the brim with a fabulous
choice of activities, four restaurants and
outstanding accommodation options for families
and couples alike. A clifftop, southern Thai
village-inspired resort spoils lounge lizards and
adventure-seekers alike with three white-sand
beaches just steps away, a large lagoon-style
infinity pool, ancient Thai-inspired spa treatments,
traditional Thai cooking classes and equally
beguiling kayaking, hiking and island explorations.

KOH SAMUI

On the opposite side of the peninsula to Krabi, sitting snugly in the Gulf of Thailand, is the country's third largest island: Koh Samui. Part of an archipelago that includes 80 smaller islands, it's a dreamy place of white sands, turquoise waters and traditional sleepy Thai fishing villages that originally became super-popular with backpackers and for years held a reputation as a hippy paradise on a par with Bali and Goa. Now it's moved upmarket, with lavish resorts and every comfort under the sun; though nearby island Koh Phangan retains the backpacker, all-night party feel, while nature lovers and scuba-divers of all abilities head for the clear waters and teeming reefs of Koh Tao.

SIX SENSES SAMUI

It's rare to find somewhere that's as appealing to honeymooners as it is to families, but this seventh heaven of gorgeousness, nuzzled against the curvaceous headland on the island's northern tip, is all that and more. The 66 split-level villas (59 of which have a personal pool) now enjoy a lighter, brighter, breezier vibe, with sweeping panoramas over the Gulf of Thailand. The spa and eateries are perennial Samui favourites; and to cap off the luxury, your butler can arrange incredible couples' and family experiences.





BANYAN TREE SAMUI

Seventy-eight all-pool villas punctuate the white sands and tropical terraces of this resort. Glass-encased verandas and clean, modern lines make for contemporary accommodation in a resort that prides itself on wowfactor facilities, like The Rainforest (Koh Samui's only hydrotherapy spa) and fine-dining courtesy of five venues including beach grill, Sands.

Head all the way across the Gulf of Thailand and eventually, close to the border with Cambodia, you'll come to gorgeous Koh Kood. Densely covered in rainforest and edged by glorious golden sand and crystal-clear water, it's an island with the least-spoilt beaches in Thailand (and that's truly saying something); while the wild interior has plains filled with coconut and rubber trees and mountains with waterfalls. As well as those belonging to the upscale resorts accessible only by sea or helicopter, the best beaches here include Ta Pho and Khlong Chao set along a coast that's just perfect for snorkelling the beautiful coral reefs... or simply lazing your days away in a hammock.




CHIVA-SOM

BANGKOK & NORTHERN THAILAND

Chaotic, unrestrained, exhilarating, crazy, contradictory, famous and infamous... Bangkok has a huge reputation and is more than happy to play on it. Offering visitors fascinating glimpses of Thai culture amongst the colossal sheen of modernity, aeons of tradition and homeliness intertwine with ritzy new shopping malls and the incessant demands of a mega-city, while temples and historical buildings – like the Grand Palace and the Emerald Buddha – simply shine amongst five-star hotels and buzzy markets.

Northern Thailand feels like a different country again – a land of unspoilt mountains and lush forests that's steeped in ancient culture and art: both plentiful in the North's natural capital, Chiang Mai. Boating in Bangkok. This city was once known as the Venice of the East... and its canals are fascinating – you'll wonder how the craft miss each other as they crisscross the waterways. Stop at the Royal Barge National Museum to see eight of the intricately gilded state barges on display.

Take in Temple Town. Gateway to the mesmerising temples of Angkor Wat is Siem Reap: once a sleepy village but rapidly becoming a tourist mecca. The perfect base for visiting the temples, it's still totally charming with its shady tree-lined boulevards and old French shophouses. And while you're here, you can also watch a traditional Cambodian dance or take in a Khmer cookery class.



Vietnam is a land of brilliant-green paddy fields, pristine beaches and beguiling cities, with a compelling history and people as entrenched in tradition as they are embracing of the future. Deep inland, women still tend the fields in conical hats; while in the fast-paced cities, young urbanites go about their business tip-tapping away on their laptops. It's a place of staggering beauty, but also of tangling diversity. Visit vibrant capital Hanoi and find wide boulevards, shimmering lakes and narrow streets dotted with temples, where early risers are rewarded with the sight of the city's inhabitants exercising by Hoan Kiem Lake – a surreal experience.

But for those wanting something with a different pace, try cooling off in this sultry weather with a beer at Bia Hoi Junction. You won't be disappointed. Ho Chi Minh City, or Saigon as it's still known by locals, has a French colonial past that resonates in its architecture and lively café society. Yet this is a quintessentially Asian city where life, in all its noise and colour, is lived on the streets. Just outside the city borders are the Cu Chi Tunnels - over 200 miles of underground tunnels and chambers below the city that played a crucial part in the Vietnam War. The swaying, watery landscape and hushed villages of the Mekong Delta are a delicious respite from the toxic and seductive cities. Also known as Vietnam's 'Rice Basket', the area is fed by the formidable Mekong River and offers an irresistible charm with its welcoming people and quaint waterside towns.

Vietnam's excellent luxury beach resorts offer some of the finest standards in the Far East, so for white-sand beaches, warm waters and excellent diving, head for Nha Trang or Con Dao. Meanwhile, if it's cultural stimulation you're after, there's Hué, the old Imperial capital, fit to bursting with tombs, temples and palaces; and host of the biennial Festival of Hué. Must-sees also include the UNESCO World Heritage Sites of Halong Bay and Hoi An – a beautiful city and fashion mecca (with an estimated 500 tailors working there).

Although a vast area with varying climates, the wet season across Vietnam usually occurs from April to October. The rain tends to come in the afternoons, providing welcome relief from the heat. The best time to travel is between November and March.




From the Mekong's sleepy local villages, to the bustling capital Phnom Penh's cafés and colourful markets, Cambodia is Indochina's rising star. Its beaches are as beautiful, wilds as rugged, cuisine as laudable and temples as awesome as those of neighbouring Thailand and Vietnam, meaning it has all the pre-requisites for a stunning, scintillating visit. And yet it's still so far off the beaten track you'll be thinking you've got it all to yourself.

There's a plethora of memorable experiences for visitors: fascinating Khmer culture and absorbing cities like Phnom Penh and Siem Reap (a place we 're particularly fond of, thanks to the lovely riverside location, burgeoning cultural scene and one of the region's buzziest dining and drinking locales). Most come to see the legendary temple complex of Angkor Wat, where, despite being over 11 centuries old, over 100 temples remain. There's very little that can beat the sunrise or sunset there... apart from, perhaps, seeing it all from a hot-air balloon.

Although a vast area with varying climates, the wet season across Cambodia usually occurs from April to October. The rain tends to come in the afternoons, providing welcome relief from the heat. The best time to travel is between November and March.













SONG SAA PRIVATE ISLAND





LAOS

HIGHLIGHTS

Majestic Monuments. Built in the 8th and 9th centuries AD during the reign of the Syailendra Dynasty, the Borobudur Temple Compounds (set in the Kedu Valley, in the southern part of Central Java) is one of the world's greatest Buddhist monuments. At dawn and dusk the jungle surrounding this majestic UNESCO World Heritage site is bathed in ethereal light and birdsong – perfect for a spot of personal reflection.

Ubud is Bali's tranquil side, where culture and serenity take centre stage and 'Tri Hita Karana' – the spiritual relationship between Man, his environment and God – comes to the fore. Many people have come to Ubud for a day or two and ended up staying longer, such is the attraction of its rich culture and myriad activities. Dance and music shows are always popular, as is anything that helps visitors discover the unique Balinese culture; the royal palace is well worth a visit; and there's no end of art museums and galleries to explore.

POP. 1.3 BILLION

WELCOME TO CHINA

A colossus of a country: as frustrating as it is fascinating; as confident as it is confusing. There's so much to see, with dramatic landscapes, fascinating culture, endless diversity and iconic sights – no wonder it's one of the world's truly great travel experiences.

It's not just big – it's immense. The sheer scale of the world's fourth-largest nation (home to one-fifth of its people), can be overwhelming. And having been shrouded in the mysteries of communism for so long, for many it's still a great unknown. But while it's hard to imagine anywhere more 'foreign', so much of it already seems so familiar!

The Great Wall, Forbidden City, Terracotta Warriors... we can all readily bring images of these extraordinary sights to mind. The reality of China, though, is even more fascinating. It's a country of incredible contrasts: gleaming modern cities with ancient mountain villages; impressive man-made wonders with astonishing natural beauty; and the spiritual simplicity of Tibet, with the unbridled luxury of high-tech hotels.

The cities include three of the world's greatest – Beijing, Shanghai and Hong Kong – each a destination in its own right and an architectural playground of fabulous hotels, fine restaurants and more.

There are 5000 years of unbroken history here, shaped over the centuries by religion, trade, war, politics and an endlessly diverse landscape, but this country is by no means a museum piece relying on its heritage to survive. In fact, it's fast becoming a world powerhouse, driven on by incessant development and a population that truly embraces change.

And for all its majestic sights, it's the people you'll remember most – not just for their colourful chatter, constant drama and inherent entertainment; but also their sheer, unstoppable energy.

While China is a huge country with varying climates, the weather is generally hot and wet in June and July and cold from December to February, so plan to avoid these months if possible. Hong Kong can be affected by tropical cyclones from July to September.

The seat of communist power in China, where a bizarre mix of architecture – underground bomb shelters (a remnant of the paranoid 1970s) and temples shaded by sky-high glass towers, via Soviet-style monuments – makes for a mercurial experience. The 2008 Olympics gave the city a lick of shiny new paint with a legacy that includes wonderful stadia as well as pumped-up global interest, but there is still oodles of historical and local charm, like its residents who still sit and play chess on street corners, apparently unaffected by the colossal grandeur of everything that surrounds them.




AMAN SUMMER PALACE

Mere footsteps from Beijing's glorious Summer Palace, Aman occupies a series of traditional dwellings: each transformed into mini-palaces of elegance, none losing sight of their history and all dripping with mod-cons. Dining covers relaxed to all-out glamour and Chinese to Western; the spa comes with a 25-metre indoor lap pool and on-hand trainers; and there's even a private cinema.

X7AN

Xi'an's best sights are within the old city walls; and include the huge walls themselves! The four great fortified gates open each morning to the ringing of a great bell and close each night to the sound of a huge drum; and the 14th-century Bell and Drum towers are especially impressive.

But by far the biggest reason to visit Xi'an lies about 24 miles outside the city – the Terracotta Army – thousands of life-size clay warriors in a huge underground vault. Each figure is different and the level of detail will send shivers down your spine!

HONG KONG

Four main islands form the country's most-frequented, best-known areas: Honshu, Hokkaido, Kyushu and Shikoku. Honshu hosts Japan's key destinations, while the other three islands offer a host of landscapes and cultural activities. For starters, cosmopolitan Tokyo is one of Asia's most exciting metropolises. Then the choice is yours... Hakone, just two hours from Tokyo, is the gateway to the Fuji-Hakone-Izu National Park (home to mountain hot springs and the solitary, often snow-capped, strato-volcano Mount Fuji). Tranquilly beautiful Kyoto is a fine example of a blended city environment, where modernity effortlessly intertwines with the traditional. Or there's Takayama – a beautifully preserved old town with its own unique culture, once cut off from the rest of Japan.

Speaking of culture, Kanazawa – a prosperous castle town for over 300 years – is packed with first-rate sights, including one of the country's three best gardens, some great museums and several impeccably kept neighbourhoods. The same can be said of Kurashiki, a haven for history buffs with all sorts of amazing museums and temples (including the Ohara Museum of Art); and lively Takamatsu – home to historic tea houses and Ritsurin Koen – arguably one of the country's most beautiful landscaped gardens, full of serene ponds, historic trees and breathtaking pavilions. And beautiful Shinoku Island (translating to Four Countries) is home to the Iya Valley, Naoshima and Matsyuma.

Remaining firmly at the top of most visitors' 'must-see' lists however are the country's veritable melting pot of UNESCO World Heritage Sites, which on top of Mount Fuji and ancient Kyoto (Kyoto, Uji and Otsu Cities) also include the historic village of Shirakawa-go; the Hiroshima Peace Memorial (Genbaku Dome); and the Itsukushima Shinto Shrine.

So there you have it... Beautiful, relaxing, nostalgic, profound, fashionable, exciting, mouthwatering, historic, cultural and poignant – all intertwined with genuine, heart-warming hospitality... Japan really does have a little bit of everything.

Japan has four distinct seasons, but as a long collection of islands stretching for thousands of miles, the climate can vary widely, depending where you visit. Honshu and Shikoku have extra-tropical climates, the best times to visit being March to April, with November having the perfect combination of low rainfall and pleasantly warm temperatures stretching into mid-December.





HAKONE

A view of Mount Fuji is not all Hakone (also known for its volcanic rock-heated hot springs) has to offer, so take one of the various methods of transportation (mountain railway, cable car, rope-way or cruiser) to see its major sites. Don't miss O-waku-dani (where volcanic fumes still bear a trace of the Hakone Volcano which erupted 3000 years ago); Lake Ashi-noko (created in the crater of the Hakone Volcano); Susuki-sogen (silver grass field) of Sengokuhara; a stone Buddha and stone towers situated in Moto-Hakone; and cedar trees along Kyu-Kaido Street.

GORA KADAN

Hakone

This chic Japanese ryokan (guest house) – a former Imperial Family retreat – in the heart of the national park will totally immerse you into an ancient Japanese lifestyle. All 37 rooms (grand in size, minimalist in design and serene in lighting) come with unique en-suite bathrooms, seven of which feature private rotenburo outdoor baths; and we love the traditional Kaiseki-style cuisine.

KYOTO


In the central part of Japan, Kyoto is the country's cultural heart and remains awash with remnants of its past glory. 

HIGHLIGHTS

Sumo Spectacular. Six tournaments for this ancient sport are held in January, May and September each year in Tokyo, Osaka, Nagoya and Fukuoka, each lasting 15 days. Be there for the start of a new round, when the rikishi parade into the arena wearing ceremonial aprons over their loincloths. And if it's not tournament season, try to catch an early morning training session at a beya (sumo stable).

Ride the Railway. A ride on the Hakone Tozan Railway (Japan's oldest mountain railroad), isn't just a treat for railway buffs and train-spotters. The small trains wind their way through a narrow, densely wooded valley over many bridges and tunnels and, while the lower section from Odawara to Hakone-Yumoto is not particularly noteworthy, the upper section from Hakone-Yumoto to Gora is far more spectacular, particularly in June and July when the hydrangeas are in full bloom.

Land of Enchantment. Arashiyama is Kyoto's second-most important sightseeing district (and a great spot come cherry blossom season). Togetsukyo Bridge is its central landmark and there are temples, shrines, a hilltop monkey park and an attractive preserved town area from the Meji Period (1868-1912) with traditional machiya (townhouses). The star attraction though is famed Arashiyama Bamboo Grove: standing amid these soaring stalks of bamboo is like being in another world.



EDEN ADVENTURES



Magnificent and mystifying – India bristles with an eclectic mix of natural wonders, cultures and people that defies belief. It's a kaleidoscope of new experiences wherever you look, a destination that's full of surprises – and one you'll never forget.

It's a full-on assault on all your senses too. Vibrant, glowing colours hit you from all directions, while the heady scents of exotic spices and temple incense invade the air. Then there's the myriad tastes of Indian cooking, the gentle touch of ancient healing therapies and sounds that range from soothing sitar music to the incessant bustle of Delhi's streets. It's enough to have you waving a white flag.

India is a land of mesmerising multiculturalism; of landscapes – deserts, mountains, dense forests and perfect beaches; and of customs, complexity and incredible contrasts. The figures say it all: a billion people, 17 languages, 5000 years of history and the birthplace of four of the world's major religions.

For the visitor, it's difficult to know where to start – many choose the 'Golden Triangle' of capital Delhi, historic Agra and the 'pink city' of Jaipur (the country's rich past has spawned hundreds of exquisite palaces, temples and monuments, nowhere more so than here). Elsewhere the buzzing, colourful cities of Mumbai (Bombay) and Kolkata (Calcutta) have their own charm; and the holy city of Varanasi and awe-inspiring temples of Tamil Nadu in the south are equally rewarding.

Paradise-seekers should head for the tropical bliss of Goa or Kerala's palm-fringed beaches; Rajasthan is home to tiger-inhabited forests and camel-crossed deserts; and the towering beauty of the mighty Himalayas is found further north. But whatever you expect from India, it always gives you more. The possibilities are endless, the welcome exceptional and the memories oh-so enduring.

Summers in North India are hot during the day. Mornings and evenings are pleasant. Winters in most places other than the mountains can be cold early morning but very pleasant during the day. In South India, summers are hot and humid especially along the coast and winters are most pleasant.






AGRA

Most people come to Agra for one thing and one thing only – the magnificent, awe-inspiring Taj Mahal. The world's most extravagant monument to love, this throbbing white mass of marble is the globe's most recognisable love letter and, for anyone worried about the hype, it is every bit as wonderful as people say it is.




The state's second largest city, Jodhpur, is encircled by a six-mile-long wall and blessed with a number of forts, temples, gardens and lakes. The historic grandeur, exquisite handicrafts, folk dances, music and brightly attired people lend an aura of romance to the city. Be sure to visit the Thar Desert, home to the sacred Mali Nathji ka Dhora sand dune, dedicated to the Warrior God, Mewar; and Mihir Garh, named by Lonely Planet as the world's most extraordinary hotel.



RAMBAGH PALACE

Jaipur

Close to the Pink City of Jaipur, this old palace is a blend of Rajput and Mughal architecture set in over 47 acres of ornamental gardens. Facilities include the Jiva Grande Spa, two pools and an adjoining golf course; while the accommodation has all been sensitively restored: its crowning glory (the regally opulent Presidential Suryavanshi Suite), having once been part of the royal family's personal chambers.



UMAID BHAWAN PALACE

Jodhpur

Perched high above the desert capital of Jodhpur, this is the last of the great palaces of India. Set amidst 26 acres of lush gardens, the palace is a blend of Eastern and Western architectural influences. Rooms have lavish interiors with gilt furniture and elegant artwork, while recreational activities include a cutting-edge gym, the Jiva Grande Spa, two pools and tennis courts.







RANTHAMBORE NATIONAL PARK


A spectacular mass of untamed jungle hemmed by ribbons of rocky ridge, Ranthambore is a vast expanse of wild and wondrous protected parkland and part of the Ranthambore Tiger Reserve. Here, the wildlife is left to roam amongst an almost surreal scattering of historic relics, including the 10th-century Ranthambore Fort. A maharajas' hunting ground until 1970, it is the only place in Rajasthan to spot wild tigers: a feat being given a helping hand by Project Tiger. These beautiful big cats aside, there are crocodile-filled lakes and more than 300 species of bird.

AMAN-I-KHÁS

Remote and secluded, this exclusive wilderness camp offers just 10 luxury canopied tents reminiscent of those used during the Mogul Dynasty. Bordering one of the finest tiger reserves in the world (a sanctuary for wildlife and rich in cultural beauty), Aman-i-Khás is a true haven of tranquillity and operates every year from October until the end of April – the best period for wildlife spotting.

Ajabgarh is named for its founder Ajab Singh Rajawat, the grandson of Madho Singh, founder ruler of Bhangarh, Mogul Emperor Akbar The Great is said to have stayed in Ajabgarh during the inauguration of Soma Sagar, a reservoir in the hills. Its lake attracts migratory birds during winters, but Ajabgarh's finest presentday attraction has to be its old temple, dedicated to Shri Raghunathji, built in 1635 AD, with its 24-pillared open courtyard and a marble facade. This temple once housed an idol of Lord Rama and Goddess Sita bejewelled with precious stones, but has since been removed by thieves.

Bandhaygarh National Park

Nestled amongst the picturesque Vindhya Hills and lush tropical forests, this renowned 173-square-mile tiger reserve is one of the most beautiful parks in India. The dramatic landscape is home to a dense sal forest that brims with exotic flora and fauna, the ancient 1000-year-old, 800-metre-high Bandhavgarh Fort and a reclining statue of Lord Vishnu. Once the roaming ground of the white tiger, Bandhavgarh was also the former hunting reserve of the royal family of Rewa and declared a national park in 1968.



Kanha National Park


The verdant sal and bamboo forests, gushing ravines and lush meadows of Kanha make this a wistfully romantic destination for wildlife lovers. And they just so happen to be one of the best places in India to spot tigers too. The park – created in 1955 – is also home to the rare hard-ground swamp deer, thanks to stringent conservation programmes that saved them from extinction – as well as leopards and 200 species of bird, with Jeep and elephant safaris providing your best means of spotting them.

AMANBAGH

Ajabgarh


Set in a walled compound (the former staging area for royal hunts), Amanbagh evokes the Moghul era's palatial elegance. Haveli Suites and Pool Pavilions provide a sublimely tranquil base from which to explore the rich heritage of Rajasthan, India's dramatic frontier region, with every detail taken care of by the impeccable staff (typical of Aman Resorts).

Pench National Park One of Central India's lesser-known reserves, Pench National Park is situated in the Seoni and Chhindwara districts of Madhya Pradesh. A typical Central Indian teak jungle, Pench (which received international recognition from Rudyard Kipling's classic tale, the Jungle Book) supports a rich variety of wildlife, including the tiger, leopard, wild dog, gaur, sambar, chital and brilliant birdlife. The park's open habitat not only lends well to wildlife-viewing, but it also offers striking views of the area's sheer beauty.



BAGHVAN – A TAJ SAFARI LODGE

Pench National Park

Five minutes from the national park, charming Baghvan – A Taj Safari Lodge has a sweeping shaded deck surrounding a gorgeous swimming pool overlooking the nullah (dry riverbed) – a favoured route of the Pench tigers. GOA

DELHI & MUMBAI

Like two worlds colliding, Delhi is the old versus the new; and the old embracing the new. On one side, the walled city of Old Delhi – the capital of Islamic India before British occupation – is an effervescent concoction housing the imposing Red Fort. On the other side of this complex coin is New Delhi, the Imperial capital built by the British, where life spits and splutters and carries city dwellers on its mighty shoulders. Its foot is firmly in the here and now though. Hip coffee shops, bars and restaurants serving both local and international cuisine; vibrant shopping and the country's finest museums all come together to provide a multitude of diversions for Delhi's inhabitants.

Originally known as Bombay, Mumbai is so intoxicating, full-on and frustratingly wonderful that you'll be drunk on its thrills and spills within moments of entering this frantic, throbbing metropolis: an Indian behemoth that is the centre of commerce, fashion, film and fun. It's also an Indian cliché, a city of real contrasts: more than half its population is living in slums; yet it's the commercial capital of India and the world's second largest city.

For many, it's what defines the Indian city experience. But somehow this mass of humanity works and what results is a humbling tapestry of life. And once you get to grips with the chaos, there's a whole other world of deliriously lovely architecture to indulge in: Art Deco gems; grand colonial stuff including the ceremonial Gateway of India, built in 1913 to commemorate the visit of King George V and Queen Mary; and crazy bazaars selling everything you can think of. And to top it all off, the nightlife is (in)famous, restaurants are world-class and the energy? Well you'll want to slice that up and take it home with you.

HIGHLIGHTS

Delhi Delights. The old city of the Mughals is a hustling, bustling affair, dominated by the majestic Jama Masjid (one of the world's largest mosques) and the legendary Red Fort. This vast red sandstone palace with its pristine lawns and tranquil audience halls is a real contrast to the streets beyond; and its evening sound and light show recreating historical events is a must.

White Marble Wonder. However many pictures you see of the Taj Mahal, the reality is even more beautiful. At sunrise or sunset it's awe-inspiring, taking on an ethereal, misty glow. 
HIGHLIGHTS

Rural Rajasthan. Feel the very pulse of rural Rajasthan – its little mud houses; turbanclad men; shy, beautiful women dressed in traditional costumes – on an intimate village safari during your time in Rohet. Visit the homes of village folk and share a slice of their life, meet the Raikas (shepherds) with their glorious costumes and the Pliwals and Meghwals (Brahmin farmers and weavers).

2

Wild Thing. For a safari with a difference, India has at least 90 national parks and almost 500 wildlife sanctuaries; the biggest draw here being tigers, with numbers now on the rise again thanks to specific reserves like Bandhavgarh, Kanha and Ranthambore. But there's plenty more besides: leopards, bears, wolves, hyenas – not to mention spectacular lodges such as those owned by Taj Hotels.



BHIJTAN

There are places where you can get away from it all; there are those where you feel you've gone back a few decades. And then there's the Kingdom of Bhutan – its 'Land of the Thunder Dragon' moniker perfectly capturing the magic and mystery of its mountainous location. No ordinary place, this devoutly Buddhist, tiny, remote Himalayan Kingdom remains largely unaffected by outside influences and thoroughly intends to stay that way. Although economically important, tourist numbers are strictly controlled and monitored to maintain its culture, traditions and environment. In fact, just 63,367 international tourists were fortunate enough to visit in 2018.

That's not to say you won't find the modern world here – there's every chance you'll see monks transcribing ancient texts onto computers, or traditionally dressed noblemen on their mobiles – but Bhutan straddles the ancient and modern perfectly. It's the ancient you've come to see though: the centuries-old monasteries, temples and fortresses or 'dzongs' clinging to mountainsides in Bumthang; the traditional arts and crafts (Bhutan's known for its textiles particularly) and colourful religious festivals (called 'tshechu'), with their mask dances; and the mind-boggling treks through primeval valleys and gorges – more jaw-dropping than you could imagine – around Phobjika or Paro (and with 600 bird species here, don't forget your binoculars!).

Unique is too small a word for a country known as the 'last Shangri-La': this is a country that measures prosperity by Gross National Happiness rather than Gross National Product. Little surprise in such a peaceful and spiritually uplifting place as this.

Spring time, (March through to May) is the best time to visit for seeing the flowers and wildlife. October is a great time to visit and experience their festivals. The winter is barren and cold and many of the roads tend to be closed.

BREATHTAKING BHUTAN | 7 NIGHTS

Day 1 – Thimphu

Arrive in the "Land of the Peaceful Dragon" and inhale the crisp alpine air. During your drive to the capital, Thimphu, you'll seemingly step-back-in-time as you wind pass sprawling forests and landscapes dominated by traditional Dzongs and mesmerising clifftop monasteries. This deeply spiritual land, with its traditional hamlets and humble people, will leave you completely captivated with plenty to talk about over dinner.

Stay: Six Senses Thimphu (2 nights)

Day 2 – Tango Monastery

Following a restful sleep and hearty breakfast, start your daily adventure with a short bike ride, before hiking uphill to the premier Buddhist academic institution of Bhutan – the Tango Monastery (meaning 'horse head'). A rewarding end to your one-and-a-half-hour hike uphill, the return walk allows you to appreciate the scenery as you return down the valley. After lunch, visit the Folk Heritage and National Textile Museums for an introduction to Himalayan culture, handicrafts and woven textiles before visiting lofty Kunsel Phodrang (Buddha point) with its famous 'aura of peace and happiness' overlooking the southern entrance to Thimphu Valley. Then, during a restful evening, meet with an Astrologer who will produce a chart based on your birthdate and place.

Day 3 – Punakha

After breakfast head for Punakha via the panoramic Dochula Pass with its 360-degree vistas of the Himalayan mountain range and hang a prayer flag before stopping at Metshina Village. Pass through the rice fields and watch locals praying before arriving at Amankora for your overnight stay.

Stay: Amankora (2 nights)



Day 4 - Khotakha

After a leisurely breakfast, head to the large glacial valley of Khotakha, a scenic place of few people and many sacred sites, passing by pine forests, remote villages and holy water springs en-route, then enjoy an outdoor lunch with local monks.

Day - 5 Paro

On your way back to Paro, stop at the striking Simtokha Dzong, then visit the 16th-century Paro Dzong known as 'fortress on a heap of jewels' and the National Museum. Marvel at the Bhutanese architecture and the way in which Paro Dzong survived the massive earthquake of 1897 and admire the 3000 works of art held within the impressive museum. Finish your afternoon by trying your hand at the national sport – archery.

Stay: COMO Uma Paro (3 nights)

Day 6 – Kila Goenpa Nunnery Hike

Journey along the Chele La – at 3988 meters, it's considered to be one of Bhutan's highest motorable passes. Admire the thickly forested roads and the botanical treasures and sacred mountains of Jomolhari and Jichu Drake before being transfixed by colourful rhododendrons and hundreds of prayer flags blowing in the wind.

Day 7 – Taktsang Monastery Hike

Not for the faint-hearted, this lengthy trek to the beautiful Taktsang Monastery forms the pinnacle of your visit. A blessed place for a monumental finale, it's guaranteed to leave you absolutely speechless.

Day 8 – Depart Paro

Depart Paro for your international flight back to London.

There's a little bit of everything in Sri Lanka. The colour and richness of India, the beaches and rolling seas that would befit any Indian Ocean island, the ancient ruins of Indonesia and cuisine that compares with any in Asia... and it's all found in one treasure-packed teardrop-shaped gem. Marco Polo called it one of the best islands in the world. And over the centuries, Indians, Portuguese, Dutch and British have all left their mark with ancient cities, monuments and colonial architecture.

There are unexpected delights everywhere – not least its wildlife. With 15 national parks, conservation is high on the list, along with safaris to see the elusive leopard. And it's one of just a few places where the world's biggest land and sea mammals (the elephant and blue whale) can both be seen in one day.

Sri Lanka is a year-round destination with generally good weather. However, there are two annual monsoons: one that brings rain in the south west and central hills from late May to the end of September; the other occurring from November to February which affects the north east part of the island.



SRI LANKA

COLOMBO

Strategically placed in the Indian Ocean, this port has been a wide-open door to visitors for centuries. The shopping opportunities reflect the many varied faces of the capital: from the sophisticated nursery slopes of Paradise Road and its glam gifts, via the unmissably original Barefoot, to the black runs of the Pettah, Colombo's tantalising pavement bazaar. Try tapas at ZaZas, sushi at Nihonbashi, or re-live the Raj on the veranda at the grand old Galle Face Hotel, And if you can't even handle first gear, slip into neutral at the serenely minimalist Buddhist 'island' temple on Beira Lake.

KANDY

Kandy is one of Sri Lanka's most scenic cities - once an impenetrable fortress for the Sinhala monarchs, now the capital of the central province and the second-largest city in the country. Frequently visited by Buddhists (especially of the Theravada School), Kandy is famous for being home to the Temple of the Sacred Tooth Relic, Sri Dalada Maligawa, which houses Sri Lanka's most important Buddhist relic. the relic of the tooth of the Buddha. Also worth a visit are the Botanical Gardens in Peradeniya - the Kew of Kandy - which started out as a royal pleasure park in 1747.

ANURADHAPURA

Ancient cities don't get much bigger than Anuradhapura and few capitals around the world have been as long-lasting. Dating back to the 4th century BC, it was established around a cutting from the fig tree under which the Buddha gained enlightenment and this cutting - the Sri Maha Bodhi - is Anuradhapura's spiritual heart, thought to be one of the world's oldest trees. The extent of the ruins, historical sites and monasteries - over 24 square-miles - are overwhelming and often too much to explore in one day, so peddling your way around by bike is often the best way to cover more ground and actually appreciate just how extensive this fascinating city once was.



who threw in a crop of tea and never looked

back. Enigmatically surrounded by a tapestry of tea fields, reservoirs and sloping hills, Hatton is living proof that this major industry not only stood the test of time, but also made the countryside a stunning place in the process. Start your day with an adrenaline-fuelled hike up Adam's Peak, take a tea factory tour, punt on a reservoir and savour high tea atop manicured lawns before a languid croquet match.

YALA NATIONAL PARK

The oldest and most prominent of Sri Lanka's national parks spanning almost 250,000 acres of dry thorny scrub and dusty glades, Yala is an experience of epic proportions that brings you up close and personal with an untamed world of wildlife. Among its more famous residents are majestic elephants, sloth bears. sambars, jackals, spotted deer, peacocks and crocodiles, not to mention the world's biggest concentration of leopard. While you can never guarantee you'll see one of these famously elusive creatures, the chances are pretty high, especially if you stay inside the park itself. Visit between February and July when the water levels of the park are quite low and the wildlife comes out into the open.

TANGALLE


Known for its tranquillity, deserted beaches and unique eco-system, laid-back Tangalle is littered with gentle reminders of the Dutch days of the 18th century and some great beaches which stretch for several miles either side of the town (particularly Medilla and Medaketiya - the latter rarely crowded, with fine white sand and excellent swimming conditions). But on top of these, there's an awesome array of attractions elsewhere: the spectacular Hoo-mane Blowhole; the giant Buddha and shrines of Wewurukannala; and the magnificent rock temples of Mulkirigala, some of which date back over 2000 years. Elsewhere, the beach at Rekawa is the premier spot for watching giant sea turtles lay their eggs at night from January to

GALLE

July and the little-visited Kalametiya Bird

Sanctuary is great for bird-lovers.

The most perfectly preserved colonial town in all of Sri Lanka and a historical and multi-cultured melting pot, Galle is acclaimed not only for its Dutch Fort (the slow-beating heart of the town's history), but also its intricate Galle lace, ebony. wood-carvings, polished gems and steady string of cultural events, particularly the Galle Literary Festival. Gentle strolls will unravel the fort's unique history and reveal colonial buildings still in use today, a succession of bijou shops and cafés lining the streets and the ramparts and seawall, where locals and visitors alike gather to fly kites, play cricket or simply inhale the wonders of its maritime legacy.

Capital Choice. The ancient cities of Sri Lanka's Cultural Triangle are simply astonishing. Centred around Kandy, Anuradhapura and Polonnaruwa, these were important Sinhalese royal capitals in the Golden Age. Take the Tea Train. On one of the most scenic rail journeys in Asia, the train from Kandy takes you high into the hills that are home to 'Tea Land': the lush plantations at Nuwara Eliya. It even has its own 'Big Five', with the elusive leopard top of the list. The best place to see them, along with elephants and more, is on a safari in popular Yala National Park in the island's south.





Most of Australia sees Western Australia as 'all the way over there'. And true, Perth is its most isolated state capital (it's nearest noteworthy neighbours being in the Far East). But that also means Western Australia – or WA – is the first bit of Australia that European travellers reach on the long slog over and is too wonderful a place to just pass through.

Perth has more hours of sunshine per year than any other state capital and glistens beside the Swan River (home of the majestic black swan) with the blue hills of the Darling Range in the distance. BOOKING CONDITIONS

1. YOUR HOLIDAY CONTRACT

The holidays featured are operated by The Eden Collection Ltd ('the Company' /'we' /'us' /'our') which is registered in England under Company number 6664069. Your contract is with the Company and the following booking conditions together with the information set out in 'Essential Reading' and the relevant brochure descriptions, will form the basis of your contract with the Company. We both agree that English law (and no other) will apply to your contract and to any dispute, claim or other matter of any description ('claim') which arises between us. We both also agree that any such claim (and whether or not involving any personal injury) must be dealt with by the Courts of England and Wales only unless, in the case of Court proceedings, you live in Scotland $\,$ or Northern Ireland. In this case, proceedings must either be brought in the Courts of your home country or those of England and Wales. If proceedings are brought in Scotland or Northern Ireland, you may choose to have your contract and claim governed by the law of Scotland/Northern Ireland as applicable (but if you do not so choose, English law will apply). In these booking conditions, 'you' and 'your' means all persons named on the booking, or any of them as applicable (including anyone who is added or substituted at a later date). Except where otherwise stated, these booking conditions only apply to holiday arrangements which you book with us in the UK and which we agree to make, provide or perform (as applicable) as part of our contract with you. All references to 'booking', 'contract', 'holiday' or 'arrangements' mean such arrangements unless otherwise stated, 'accommodation' means the hotel, apartment or chalet which you have booked as part of your holiday and 'departure' means the start date of the arrangements you have booked with us.

2. YOUR FINANCIAL PROTECTION

For flights and flight inclusive arrangements, we provide security for the monies that you pay us and for your repatriation in the event of our insolvency by way of an ATOL number (9902) administered by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA). When you buy an ATOL-protected air holiday package and/or flights from us, you will receive a confirmation invoice from us (or via our authorised travel agent) confirming your arrangements and your protection under the Company's ATOL*. In the unlikely event of our insolvency, the CAA will ensure that you are not stranded abroad and will arrange to refund any money you have paid to us for an advance booking. For further information, visit the ATOL website at wy atol.org.uk. Not all holiday or travel services offered by us are protected by the ATOL scheme, all non-air inclusive holiday packages* are protected by ABTA (Y6116). ABTA will financially protect your arrangements in the same way except that, if you are already abroad, you will be returned to the $\,$ point where your contracted arrangements with us were due to finish. Please go to www.abta.com for a copy of the guide to ABTA's scheme of financial protection. The company does not provide financial protection for accommodation-only

*The air inclusive holidays we arrange are ATOL protected providing either the person who pays for the booking is present in the UK when the booking is made or the first leg of any flight or flights we arrange for you commences in the UK. Please note – some of the clauses in these booking conditions only apply to arrangements which constitute a 'package'. A package is a combination of at least two out of accommodation, transport and other tourist services, where bought from us at the same time, at an inclusive price. Therefore, these clauses will not apply to any 'accommodation only' (including villas) bookings. The clauses which only apply to packages are clearly identified below.

3. BOOKING

On making an enquiry with us or one of our authorised travel agents regarding a holiday booking, we will issue you with a quote. To secure your booking (subject to availability), you should telephone us or your authorised travel agent to confirm your booking and pay the relevant deposit as detailed in clause 4. All correspondence will be sent to the client at the address specified or, where you book through one of our authorised travel agents, to the agent. The person who makes the booking ('party leader') guarantees that he/she has the authority to accept and does accept on behalf of all members of your party, the terms of these booking conditions. The party leader accepts

responsibility for paying for all persons named on the booking and for keeping them advised of the booking details and all information we send to you. A contract will exist between us as soon as we issue our confirmation invoice. Please check the contents of the invoice and all other items we send you carefully and, in the event of a discrepancy or error, contact us immediately as it may not be possible to make changes later. We regret we cannot accept any liability if we are not notified of any inaccuracy in any document within 14 days of our sending it out (5 days for tickets). We will do our best to rectify any mistake notified to us outside these time limits but you must meet any costs involved in doing so. The only exception to this requirement to meet costs is where the mistake in question was made by us and there is good reason why you did not tell us about it within these time limits.

4. PAYMENT/DEPOSIT

A minimum deposit of 10%, with a minimum of £250* per person of the total holiday cost must be paid at the time you confirm your booking. For villa and chalet bookings, a deposit of 30% of the total holiday cost is required. The amount of your deposit will be notified to you when we issue you with a quote. Approximately 12 weeks before the date your arranger are due to commence, we will send you a final invoice. Where applicable, this invoice will show any surcharge which has become payable – see clause 6 'The Price You Pay'. The price of your holiday as shown on your final invoice will not increase Usually, the balance of the cost of your arrangements must be received by us not less than 10 weeks before the date your arrangements are due to commence. If the booking is made within 10 weeks (or after the balance due date if earlier) of the date your arrangements are due to commence, the full cost of the holiday must be paid at the time of the booking. For sor holidays or elements of holidays, full payment must be received earlier than 10 weeks in advance. We will advise you at the time of booking where this is the case. In the event that the bala is not paid by the due date, we have the right to treat your holiday as cancelled by you and you will forfeit all payments made or due at that date. Alteration or cancellation by a client of an accepted booking will be subject to the provisions of these booking conditions

*Please note that higher deposits may be requested if prepayments to suppliers are necessary. All payments made at the time of booking are non-refundable except where otherwise specifically stated in these booking conditions.

NB:A selection of our airline fares require full payment at the time of booking and also carry 100% cancellation charges. If this is the case, we will advise you at the time of booking. We reserve the right to pass on 1.5% credit card charges for all holiday balance payments.

Except for flight inclusive bookings, all monies you pay to an authorised travel agent for your booking with us will be held by the agent on your behalf until we issue our confirmation invoice. After that point, the agent will hold the monies on our behalf until they are paid to us. For flight inclusive bookings all monies you pay to an authorised travel agent for your booking with us will be held by the travel agent on our behalf until they are paid to us or refunded to you.

5. SPECIAL REQUESTS AND DISABILITIES / MEDICAL PROBLEMS

If you have any special request, you must advise us in writing at the time of booking. Although we will endeavour to pass any reasonable requests on to the relevant supplier, we regret we cannot guarantee any request will be met unless we have specifically confirmed this. For your own protection, you should obtain confirmation in writing from us that your request will be complied with (where it is possible for us to give this) if your request is important to you. Confirmation that a special request has been noted or passed on to the supplier or the inclusion of the special request on your confirmation invoice or any other documentation is not confirmation that the request will be met. Unless and until specifically confirmed, all special requests are subject to availability. We regret we cannot accept any conditional bookings, i.e. any booking which is specified to be conditional on the fulfilment of a particular request. All such bookings will be treated as 'standard' bookings subject to the above provisions on special requests. If you have any medical problem or disability which may affect your arrangements or

any special requirements as a result of any medical condition or disability (including any which affect the booking process), please tell us before you confirm your booking so that we can assist you in considering the suitability of your chosen arrangements and/or making the booking. In any event, you must give us full details in writing at the time of booking and whenever any change in the condition or disability occurs. 6. THE PRICE YOU PAY

Our price promise is based on a like-for-like quote at the same time of booking compared to suppliers' published/rack rates. The prices shown in this brochure were calculated on the basis of then known costs and exchange rates. We reserve the right to alter and correct errors in the prices of any of the holidays $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right\} =\left$ shown in this brochure. You will be advised of the current price of the holiday that you wish to book, at the time of booking Once the price of your chosen holiday has been confirmed at the time of booking, then subject to the correction of errors, we will only increase or decrease the price in the following circumstances, A surcharge or refund (as applicable) will be payable, subject to the conditions set out in this clause, in the event of any change in our transportation costs or in dues taxes or fees payable for services such as landing taxes or embarkation or disembarkation fees at ports or airports. We will not however surcharge for variations in exchange rates. Even in the above cases, only if the amount of any increase in our costs exceeds 5% of the total cost of your holiday (excluding any amendment charges) will we levy a surcharge. If any surcharge is greater than 10% of the cost of your holiday (excluding any amendment charges), you will be entitled to cancel your booking and receive a full refund of all monies you have paid to us (except for any amendment charges) or alternatively purchase another holiday from us as referred to in clause 11 'Cancellation or Changes Made by the Company Where applicable, you have 14 days from the issue date printed on the surcharge invoice to tell us if you want to choose option (b) or (c) as set out in clause 11 below. If you do not tell us that you wish to choose either of these options within this period of time, we are entitled to assume that you do not wish to do so and will pay the surcharge. Any surcharge must be paid with the balance of the cost of your arrangements. Please note that arrangements are not always purchased in local currency and some apparent changes have no impact on the price of your holiday due to contractual and other protection in place. A refund will only be payable if the decrease in our costs exceeds 5% of the total cost of your holiday as set out above. Where a refund is due, we will pay you the full amount of the decrease in our costs. We promise not to levy a surcharge after we send you our final invoice approximately 12 weeks prior to departure. No refund will be payable if any decrease in our costs occurs during this period either.

7. IF YOU CHANGE YOUR BOOKING

If, after your confirmation invoice has been issued, you wish to change your travel arrangements in any way, we will do our utmost to make these changes, however, please note that it may not always be possible. Any request for changes to be made must be in writing from the person who made the booking. You will be required to pay an administration charge of £45 per booking, plus any further costs we incur or our suppliers incur or impose in making this alteration. You should be aware that these costs could increase the closer to the departure date that changes are made, and you should contact us as soon as possible. NB: Certain travel arrangements, like many flight bookings for example, cannot be changed after a reservation has been made and, therefore, any alteration requests could incur a cancellation charge of up to 100% of that part of the arrangements, plus any additional charges for replacement services.

8. INABILITY TO TRAVEL

 $(This \ clause \ applies \ to \ packages \ only)$

If any booked person is prevented from travelling on the holiday you booked due to genuine circumstances (such as your own personal injury or illness or the death or serious illness of a close relative), the Company will agree to that person's booking being transferred to another suitable person (introduced by you) provided they meet all the requirements relating to that holiday and, that the holiday arrangements

remain the same apart from the name change. You must provide proof of why you are unable to travel, at the time you request to transfer your booking. The Company must be given reasonable notice of the transfer request and in any event, the booking cannot be transferred within 14 days of the date of departure. If the transfer can be made then an administration charge of £45 per booking together with all costs and charges levied or incurred by the suppliers must be paid before the transfer will be effected. For flight inclusive arrangements, you must pay the charges levied by the airline concerned. As most airlines do not permit name changes after tickets have been issued for any reason, these charges are likely to be the full cost of the original flight in addition to the cost of the new flight. Bookings may not be transferred to another person in any other circumstance. In the event of you transferring your booking to another person, you are jointly and severally liable for payment of the holiday cost and other associated expenses. The person to whom the booking is transferred must agree to be bound by these booking conditions.

9. CANCELLATIONS

You are required to pay the balance of your holiday by the due date, as shown on your invoice. If you do not, then the Company reserves the right to cancel the booking and retain your deposit. You may cancel your holiday arrangements, or any part of them, at any time. To make a cancellation, the party leader must write to the Company as soon as possible with full details. Since we incur costs in cancelling your holiday arrangements, you will have to pay the applicable cancellation charges as detailed below. Upon receipt of the written cancellation at our offices, the following charges will be levied depending on the number of days prior to departure:

Where any cancellation affects the basis on which the cost of your holiday was calculated (for example, where as a result only one person will occupy a double/twin room), we will recalculate the cost and re-invoice you accordingly.

The above cancellation charges may vary to reflect the terms and conditions of the Company's suppliers and some bookings are subject to 100% cancellation charges if cancelled at any time. You will be advised at the time of booking if the conditions vary and if higher cancellation charges apply.

NB: We strongly recommend that you have adequate TRAVEL INSURANCE including cancellation cover. If the reason for your cancellation is covered under the terms of your insurance policy, you may be able to reclaim these charges (less any applicable excess) from the insurance company.

10. ALTERATION TO A CONFIRMED BOOKING AFTER TRAVEL HAS COMMENCED

We regret that no credit or refund is possible for any unused services included in the cost of your holiday. If you decide to alter your travel arrangements whilst abroad this is your own responsibility and the Company is not responsible for any extras or difficulties that may arise with onward travel as a result of such alterations. No credit or refund is possible for any lost, mislaid, stolen or destroyed documents.

11.CANCELLATION OR CHANGES MADE BY THE COMPANY

Occasionally, we may have to make changes to your holiday arrangements and we reserve the right to do so at any time. Most of these changes will be minor and we will advise you of them at the earliest possible date. We also reserve the right in any circumstances to cancel your travel arrangements. We will not cancel your travel arrangements st han 8 weeks before your departure date, except for reasons of force majeure' (see clause 12) or failure by you to pay the final balance.

NB: Carriers, such as airlines, referred to in the brochure may be subject to change. Such a change is deemed to be a minor change. Other examples of minor changes include alteration of your outward/return flights by less than 12 hours, change to different accommodation of the same standard and changes to aircraft type (where advised).

If we have to make a significant change before the date your arrangements are due to commence we will inform you or your travel agent as soon as reasonably practical. Significant changes are changes to your confirmed arrangements such as a change of UK airport to one which is more inconvenient to you (except as between Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted), a change of resort or accommodation to a lower category/standard or an alteration to the outward or return time of your international flight (where arranged by us) by more than 12 hours. If there is time to do so we will offer you the choice of:

- a) accepting the changed arrangements, or
 b) purchasing other arrangements from us, or
 c) cancelling your arrangements and receiving a
 full refund of all monies you have paid to us
- Please note, the above options are not available where any change made is a minor one.

If we have to make a significant change or cancel less than 8 weeks before the date your arrangements are due to commence we will pay you the compensation payments set out in the table below depending on the circumstances and when the significant change or cancellation is notified to you subject to the following exceptions. Compensation will not be payable and no liability beyond offering the above-mentioned choices can be accepted where we are forced to make a change or cancel as a result of unusual and unforeseeable circumstances beyond our control, the consequences of which we could not have avoided even with all due care. No compensation will be payable and the above options will not be available if we cancel as a result of your failure to comply with any requirement of these booking conditions entitling us to cancel (such as paying on time) or if the change made is a minor one.

Very rarely, we may be forced by 'force majeure' (see clause 12) to change or terminate your arrangements after they have commenced but before their scheduled end. This is extremely unlikely but if this situation does occur, we will try to obtain refunds for any unused services from our suppliers. If we are successful we will pass these on to you after deducting our own costs in obtaining them. If we are not successful we regret we cannot give you any refund as this situation is totally outside our control. We cannot pay you any compensation $% \left(x\right) =\left(x\right)$ or be responsible for any costs or expenses incurred by you as a result. In accordance with EU Regulation 2111/2005we are required to bring to your attention the existence of a 'Community List' of airlines which are subject to an operating ban in the EU and to advise you of the actual carrier operating your flight/connecting flight/transfer or, if not known, the likely carrier. We do this by listing the carriers to be used or likely to be used in the Airline Information pages and, where known, advising you of the operating airline at the time of booking. Any changes to the actual airline after you have received your tickets will be notified to you as soon as possible and in all cases at check-in or at the boarding gate. Such a change is deemed to be a minor change. The Community List of banned carriers is available for inspection at http:// ec.europa.eu/transport/air-ban/list_en.htm If the carrier with whom you have a confirmed reservation becomes subject to an operating ban as above as a result of which we/the carrier are unable to offer you a suitable alternative, the above provisions of this clause 11 where a significant change is made will apply.

12. FORCE MAJEURE

Except where otherwise expressly stated in these booking conditions, we regret we cannot accept liability or pay any compensation where the performance or prompt performance

of our contractual obligations is prevented or affected by, or you otherwise suffer any damage, loss or expense of any nature as a result of, 'force majeure'. Circumstances amounting to 'force majeure' include any event that we or the supplier of the services in question could not, even with all due care, foresee or avoid such as (whether actual or threatened) war, civil strife, riot, terrorist activity, industrial dispute, natural or nuclear disaster, fire, sickness, weather conditions, the acts of any government or public authority and all similar events which are beyond our control. Please note that we are reliant on information provided by the Foreign Office.

13. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE COMPANY

(Clause 13(1) applies to packages only)

 $(1) \ We \ promise \ to \ make \ sure \ that \ the \ arrangements \ we \ have$ agreed to make, perform or provide as applicable as part of our contract with you are made, performed or provided with reasonable skill and care. This means that, subject to these booking conditions, we will accept responsibility if. for example, you suffer death or personal injury or your contracted arrangements are not provided as promised or prove deficient as a result of the failure of ourselves, our employees, agents or suppliers to use reasonable skill and care in making, performing or providing, as applicable, your contracted arrangements. Please note it is your responsibility to show that reasonable skill and care has not been used if you wish to make a claim against us. In addition, we will only be responsible for what our employees, agents and suppliers do or do not do if they were at the time acting within the course of their employment (for employees) or carrying out work we had asked them to do (for agents and suppliers).

(2) We will not be responsible for any injury, illness, death, loss (including loss of possessions and loss of enjoyment), damage, expense, cost or other sum or claim of any description whatsoever which results from any of the following:

- the act(s) and/or omission(s) of the person(s) affected or any member(s) of their party or
- the act(s) and/or omission(s) of a third party not connected with the provision of your arrangements and which were unforeseeable or unavoidable or
- 'force majeure' as defined in clause 12 above

(3) Please note, we cannot accept responsibility for any services which do not form part of our contract. This includes, for example, any additional services or facilities which your accommodation or any other supplier agrees to provide for you where the services or facilities are not advertised in our brochure/on our website and we have not agreed to arrange them as part of our contract and any excursion you purchase during your holiday. Please also see clause 17 'Excursions and Activities.' In addition, regardless of any wording used by us on our website, in any of our brochures or elsewhere, we only promise to use reasonable skill and care as set out above and we do not have any greater or different liability to you.

(4) The promises we make to you about the services we have agreed to provide or arrange as part of our contract – and the laws and regulations of the country in which your claim or complaint occurred – will be used as the basis for deciding whether the services in question had been properly provided. If the particular services which gave rise to the claim or complaint complied with local laws and regulations applicable to those services at the time, the services will be treated as having been properly provided. This will be the case even if the services did not comply with the laws and regulations of the UK which would have applied had those services been provided in the UK. The exception to this is where the claim or complaint concerns the absence of a safety feature which might lead a reasonable holiday maker to refuse to take the arrangements in question.

(5) For all claims which do not involve death or personal injury or luggage or personal possessions, if we are found liable to you on any basis, the maximum amount we will have to pay you is twice the price (excluding amendment charges) paid by or on behalf of the person(s) affected in total unless a lower limitation applies to your claim under clause 13(6) below or elsewhere in these booking conditions. This maximum amount will only be payable where everything has gone wrong and you have not received any benefit at all from your arrangements.

Where we are found liable for loss of and/or damage to any luggage or personal possessions (including money), the maximum we will have to pay you is £1000 per person affected unless a lower limitation applies to your claim under this clause or clause 13(6) below. Please note: Where a carrier would not be obliged to make any payment to you under the applicable international convention or regulation in respect of a claim or part of a claim, we similarly are not obliged to make a payment to you for that claim or part of the claim. When making any payment, we are entitled to deduct any money which you have received or are entitled to receive from the carrier for the claim in question. Copies of the applicable International Conventions and Regulations are available from us on request.

(7) We cannot accept any liability for any damage, loss, expense or other sum(s) of any description (a) which on the basis of the information given to us by you concerning your booking prior to our accepting it, we could not have foreseen you would suffer or incur if we breached our contract with you or (b) which did not result from any breach of contract or other fault by ourselves or our employees or, where we are responsible for them, our suppliers. Additionally we cannot accept liability for any losses or expenses which relate to any business (including self-employed loss of earnings).

14. YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

(1) It is your responsibility to arrive at the correct departure point in good time before departure and any loss, damage or expense which you suffer through failure to do so lies with you. We cannot accept any liability if you miss your flight or any other form of transport.
